THE LORD HAS SAVED ME! The first Christian community endured great persecution. Like Peter in prison, fastened with double chains and watched over by four sets of guards, it seemed the Church had no chance to escape from its predicaments. But time and again, the Lord delivered it. The Church still faces immense difficulties as it battles with evil in various forms. But if, like Paul, the Christian community keeps the faith and fights the good fight, the forces of evil will never prevail.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Acts 12: 1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Now I know it is indeed true: the Lord has saved me from the power of Herod.

King Herod started persecuting certain members of the Church. He beheaded James the brother of John, and when he saw that this pleased the Jews he decided to arrest Peter as well. This was during the days of Unleavened Bread, and he put Peter in prison, assigning four squads of four soldiers each to guard him in turns. Herod meant to try Peter in public after the end of Passover week. All the time Peter was under guard the Church prayed to God for him unremittingly.

On the night before Herod was to try him, Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, fastened with double chains, while guards kept watch at the main entrance to the prison. Then suddenly the angel of the Lord stood there, and the cell was filled with light. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him. 'Get up!' he said 'Hurry!' – and the chains fell from his hands. The angel then said, 'Put on your belt and sandals.' After he had done this, the angel next said, 'Wrap your cloak round you and follow me.' Peter followed him, but had no idea that what the angel did was all happening in reality; he thought he was seeing a vision. They passed through two guard posts one after the other, and reached the iron gate leading to the city. This opened of its own accord; they went through it and had walked the whole length of one street when suddenly the angel left him. It was only then that Peter came to himself. 'Now I know it is all true,' he said. 'The Lord really did send his angel and has saved me from Herod and from all that the Jewish people were so certain would happen

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE HEART OF DISCIPLESHIP

Today's Feast celebrates the universality of our catholic world. We know from the *Book of Acts* and Paul's letters that Peter and Paul struggled to come to an agreement as to their respective missionary focus. For Peter it was to the Jews; for Paul, to the non-Jewish, Gentile world. While both retained their Jewish identity, they saw that God's commitment of love was to all and not restrictive to one cultural or religious grouping.

Matthew's Gospel affirms the role of Peter as the foundational disciple, the 'rock' (in Greek, 'Petros'), for the fledgling Jesus movement. But this is preceded by the most important and essential characteristic of discipleship and leadership within this movement: a firm witness of Jesus as God's anointed one, the 'Son of the living God.' Peter's affirmation of Jesus' identity comes from God. It is a statement of faith upon which the Jesus movement is built.

Faith lies at the heart of discipleship; witnessing to Jesus' relationship to God precedes any form of leadership. Peter is portrayed in Matthew's Gospel as a flawed, even failed disciple (and leader). We are only too aware today of the failings in ecclesial leadership. However, relationship with Jesus, the one from God, is what sustains and enables the 'rock', that firm foundation, to carry the Church through into a future that is uncertain.

Words from the desk of the PP:

Carlos Acutis & Evangelisation:

Keep a look out for the date and time: this will be a marvellous evening of immersing ourselves in seeing / understanding this wonderful young man who fell in love with Christ Jesus (in the Eucharist) and burned to share this love. Please: find the date; the time; the place (just read the notice). I hope that this evening with Carols Acutis will be an evening which helps each of us grow a little further as intentional, missionary disciples.

Damascus / Lebanon:

I was talking to a parishioner recently – he is a native of Lebanon and knows the peoples of Lebanon and Syria and more importantly the received languages / history of the area as understood by those peoples.

A Google / or Wikipedia search gives other meanings of the names Damascus and Lebanon than the ones that Parishioner told me.

Damascus: two syllables in its origins – the oldest settled town as we know towns that is known of (though some places in Australia were settled in a somewhat different form many thousands of years earlier). In this man's understanding – the name Damascus means Blood Spilt or Blood Split: this was the site where Cain killed Able and spilt his blood but in spilling blood split the family.

Lebanon: with a meaning of "heart of God"

I am surprised by language all the time. I use words to convey meaning. I know the words well. And suddenly I find something new about them by understanding a little of the origins of the words. To find that decimated doesn't mean wiped out, as is the common usage today, but rather means to have one tenth killed: a punishment for a corps of soldiers in the Roman Army when they failed in their duty as soldiers.

What words do people speak that I misunderstand? What words to I speak that I don't understand? What room for confusion.

As we celebrate the Feast of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, who had to learn and change and grow in so many ways to understand the Jesus Christ with whom they fell in love, let us be open to spending time to hear the words we use and others speak: and making time to understand the depth and breadth of the words used and why they are used. Then perhaps we will understand each other more clearly and move towards peace, mercy, and love in a complicated, divided, and far too often violent world. Let us be open to the Holy Spirit empowering us to be Christ's presence.
